

Dear Friends,

Looking out on a sunny, frosty morning, it seems impossible to believe that Spring is almost upon us and that the season of Lent (Old English, lengthen, the days are getting longer) is nearly upon us. But now is the time, alongside marmalade making, to plan for 2022, and for me, BibLit22 is a particular source of excitement and anticipation, among the many things that I am looking forward to, including weddings and Birthdays.

The reasons are many and varied

- 1) The obvious. I love books and reading. And to spend a weekend celebrating one of my great pleasures which is also a main spring of my life, work and ministry is a real joy. (Find a job you enjoy, and you will never work again)
- 2) Writing is a fundamental form of creativity. The reason that literature (like art and music) are embraced so enthusiastically by the Church is that the act of creation is seen as a core attribute of God, and therefore to celebrate creativity is to be drawn close to the heart of God. In Peter Shaffer's *Amadeus* you will recall the jealous Salieri agonising over his personal realisation that God is speaking sublime beauty, revealing Himself, in music, through the loathsome, potty-mouthed, man-child, Mozart.
- 3) Writing is so very personal, like all forms of art (Drama, and sport are now drawn into our broad definition) and involves exposing our very being to others to judge, comment upon, and sneer at. Writers, musicians, actors, sportsmen and women, poets, artists, sculptors, all who create, display amazing courage. This term, at the school, Courage has been our key value, and it has been fascinating, exploring, with the children, the many and varied ways that courage is daily displayed. BibLit is a celebration of the bravery of writers
- 4) And to meet the writers of the books we love or books that we are yet to read is a revelation. Because, whilst sometimes writers have poured their souls into a book with searing, painful honesty, in others, like Aticus Finch, they have inhabited the flesh of another. Often at extreme cost, to help us to understand.
- 5) And so BibLit challenges me. Do I have the courage to publish? The discipline and perseverance to write a book? 2022 will show me.
- 6) And, of course, writing as I am, at the tail end of the Christmas season, I remember that the Word became flesh. When God wanted to make Himself fully known, His words took on human form. The ultimate form of self-actualisation and revelation.

So do put **BibLit 2022** in your diary. **22nd-24th April 2022**. Internationally acclaimed local writer, Anne de Courcy launches her latest biography on Nancy Cunard. Andrew Lownie speaks about his controversial works on The Duke and Duchess of Windsor and Lord Mountbatten. Jane Ridley speaks about her new book on George V, whilst Simon Heffer will reflect on editing the unexpurgated diaries of 'Chips' Channon. Jesse Childs on her new book about the civil war siege of Basing House; John Preston (who wrote the Netflix drama, The Dig) will reflect on his books about Jeremy Thorpe (also televised) and Robert Maxwell; Sir Christopher Meyer, and Boris's sister Rachel Johnson, complete the line up.

And to round it all off, on the morning of Sunday 24th April, former cabinet minister, ex-convict, and prison chaplain, Jonathan Aitken will be speaking in place of the normal 11:00am service.

BIBURY GARDENING CLUB

You've probably noticed that the price of everything - from energy and petrol to food, clothing and household goods – is rocketing up. Plants and garden sundries are no exception to this trend. Two or three years ago, you could have bought three bags of multipurpose compost for £12 (on a buy two, get one free deal). Today you'd be lucky to get three for £20.

Packets of seeds are more expensive than ever, and contain even fewer seeds. If you're buying something like tomato or cucumber seeds, you're lucky if there are more than half a dozen seeds in the packet. Raising plants from seed is one of the things thrifty gardeners have done for centuries to save money. However, when you add in the cost of compost, equipment such as seed trays, and watering - never mind heating a greenhouse - the expenses start to mount up.

It is this issue that George Blackwell and I will be discussing at the March meeting of the Bibury gardening club. We'll be looking at how to get more bang for your gardening bucks: is it cheaper, for example, to raise from seed or buy garden-ready plants online or at the garden centre? Are you better to buy one hardy perennial with a good established root system, from which you can take cuttings or split to create more plants? Or is it still less expensive to sow your own?

March marks the start of the club's year, so we will be taking subscriptions at the meeting in the village hall on Wednesday 9 March at 7.15pm. The rate is £25 per person, which has been the same for the past three years. Having just talked about rising prices, the last thing we want to do is add to people's financial burdens!

April's meeting will be on Wednesday 13 April, and our guest speaker will be Vanessa Berridge, garden writer and National Garden Scheme county organiser for Gloucestershire. She will be talking about her latest book, on Borde Hill Garden, near Haywards Heath in West Sussex. Borde Hill is a tribute to the intrepid plant hunters of the 1900s, and contains plants from four continents. The estate was bought by Colonel Stephenson in 1893 with the specific aim of creating a magnificent garden, and he sponsored plant-hunting expeditions to Burma, China, Tasmania and the Andes.

We welcome new members, so come along and enjoy the evening, even if it is just for the home-made cake.

LOCAL NEWS FROM 1899

Lucky escape for 16 people when day-trip wagon overturned on Ablington Hill

A shocking accident occurred on Friday 11th August 1899, when a horse-drawn wagon taking 16 people on an excursion overturned on Ablington Hill.

It marred the final day of a gathering of the Gloucestershire Archaeological Society being held in Fairford. A highlight of the three-day event was the daily outings in horse-drawn 'brakes' to Cotswold sites of special historic and archeological interest. ('Brakes' were open-topped wagons fitted with seats that could be removed when the wagon was needed for agricultural work. Not at all a luxurious way to travel, and with no protection from sun, wind or rain).

There must have been a party atmosphere as the brakes, each with a dozen or more people onboard, set out from Fairford. On the day of the accident, the party had an ambitious itinerary that included visits to the church of St Swithin and the Hospitallers Gate in Quenington, the church and manor house in Coln St Aldwyns, and the manor houses of Bibury and Ablington.

After Ablington, they were due to visit Barnsley church and Barnsley House, then finish the outing in Cirencester where afternoon tea was being provided by Wilfred Cripps and his wife (Countess Bismark) in the grounds of their private home 'Walnut Trees' in Thomas Street.

Cripps, from an old Cirencester family, was a banker by profession, but had a strong interest in antiquarian subjects and local archeology. During the visit the guests were excepting to take a look at the latest additions to his private museum.

Not all the delegates made it to the tea party. As the wagon train was leaving Ablington early in the afternoon, the un-named driver of one of the brakes unwisely tried to drive up Ablington Hill with his 16 passengers onboard. (Press reports are unclear about whether this was the driver's decision or at the passengers' insistence).

Two horsepower was not enough for the steep hill. The wagon stopped, and then started rolling back down the hill. It veered to one side, hit the verge and tipped over. All the passengers were thrown out; some into a hedge.

It was a miracle that no-one was killed. Everyone was badly shaken, and injuries reported in the *Cheltenham Chronicle* and other local newspapers ranged from cuts and bruises to dislocations and fractures. Fortunately there were several doctors on the trip, and they were able to deal with the injuries. Some passengers were taken to local cottages to regain their composure, and some were later sent to hospital.

A lady from Frome was so badly cut around the face that she spent the night at The Swan Hotel ... or at Ablington Manor, courtesy of Mrs Monk Gibbs, depending on which newspaper you trust. There was no mention of what happened to the horses.

Footnote: The newspaper reports stated that the accident happened on 'Ablington Hill'. But where is this? As the wagon train was leaving Ablington and heading for Barnsley, it seems most likely the incident happened on the road that climbs steeply up towards The Pike. Does anyone know if this was ever known locally as Ablington Hill?
