BIBURY, BARNSLEY AND WINSON CHURCHES

Dear Friends,

Lent begins this month on Wednesday 2nd March, with Ash Wednesday, so have your frying pans at the ready for Mardi Gras. Fat Tuesday. Shrove Tuesday. It is that time of year again. Spring and the scent of pancakes will be filling the air, in the long build up to Easter Sunday, the high point of the Christian year. Whilst Christmas is the more famous and popular feast, and the dark is finally held back at the solstice, as the light breaks in, Easter really is the pinnacle of faith. And in the northern hemisphere it works so well, as the weather and the seasons continue to testify to the triumph of light and the miracle of new birth, as the dead earth returns to life.

Lent, as we know, is simply olde English for lengthen (as the days get longer) and it kicks off with Shrove Tuesday (Shriven Tuesday), the day of being shriven, or going to confession, a good starting point to the penitential season of Lent. Mardi Gras/Fat Tuesday was simply referring to the using up of sweet stuff and fat in one big 'whoopie' as a time of fasting and self-denial commences. In Lent, the 40 days and 40 nights of Jesus's time of preparation, and temptation, and fasting are recalled. And Christians seek to emulate that time with self-discipline (Not a popular concept, but essential if you actually want to succeed at anything.) and reflection. The period exceeds 40 days because, for Christians, Sundays aren't counted, as they can never be fast days, because Sunday is a weekly celebration of the resurrection. (Explaining the dramatic shift from Saturday to Sunday for early Jewish Christians)

Four weeks into Lent we have a bit of a knees up on Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent, a fun event, with no genuine connection to Lent, and then onwards to Easter.

As Easter draws closer we begin to enact the Jesus's last week on earth, starting with Palm Sunday. The final week of Jesus's life takes up almost half of the four Gospels which is odd if you think about it (How many biographies focus on their subject's final seven days?) and is why the Gospels are clearly not biographies. Mark's Gospel, for example, has been described as a passion narrative with an introduction, such is the dominance of that final week. Passion, as the children of Bibury School know, comes from the Greek word pasco, meaning I suffer, nothing to do with our headteacher, but everything to do with Christ's suffering. And, of course, you will have noticed, Easter is a moveable feast, meaning that, unlike Christmas, it has no fixed date. It is linked to the Jewish Passover, the time Jesus died, which is linked, in turn, to full moons. The old prayer book used to have a table in it that helped you work out the date of Easter up to and including 2199. They built things to last, and it was something to do in long, tedious sermons. But the rule of thumb is that Easter is always on the first Sunday after the full moon, which takes place on or after 21st March.

How you choose to keep Lent is, of course, up to you.

We have several special services, but I would like to particularly invite you to a pair of ZOOM events to complement one of our Lent books. The book, written by a former pupil of mine, Henry Martin, Vincent van Gogh and the Good Samaritan is a wonderful read for Lent. Henry, former Senior Chaplain at HMP Strangeways, is brilliant and will join us from his home in France on Monday 21st March & Monday 11th April at 6:00pm. (Links after the Service schedule)

In the Baptist Church records of 1851 the attendance on both Sunday morning and evening services was over 200 with 80 children attending the Sunday school hence the need for a large schoolroom, this also explains why the building has been extended at various times through history with varying architecture, this facility and access has been extensively modernised and we are proud to be reopening for community use and invite everyone to come and view on Easter Sunday we will be open all day.



Also on Easter Sunday afternoon we will be running the popular "Bunny Hunt" for families, starting Opposite The Swan Hotel by the river to follow a trail around the village with prizes for all children and we will be serving refreshments from the new kitchen with an official opening ceremony of the new facilities at 4.30pm in The Old Schoolrooms.

For locals needing to drive to visit us we have a new car park for several vehicles and flat disabled access into the building around the back via the new Manse which is available for locals to use for events and services at ABC.

In the lead up to Easter we prepare with a time of reflection known as Lent when Jesus went into the wilderness for 40 days and nights to spend time with God his father and prepare for his ministry, the first words of Jesus teaching after his time of contemplation according to the gospel of Mark in the bible are "The time has come" "The kingdom of God is near" "Turn away from your sins and believe the good news." Lent starts on 2nd March and rather than the



traditional give something up for 40 days, why not do something positive each day? Perhaps spend a time of mindfulness each day as Jesus did quietly reflecting on those three sentences above.

BIBURY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

Sharing a passion for excellence!



The teachers and pupils have had a very busy start to the school year, with the new term being packed with learning, outings and activities. Acorns Class have been learning about traditional tales in English, honing writing techniques and developing their use of adventurous vocabulary. Their writing is becoming increasingly sophisticated using this approach and their knowledge of vocabulary is ever expanding! The class enjoyed a trip to STEAM museum in Swindon in January, where they learnt about George Stephenson and Isambard Kingdom Brunel for History. Our children were a pleasure to take away and impressed the museum staff with their attentive listening and beautiful manners. It was wonderful to be able to take the children off site to benefit from the hands-on learning available at this museum. In addition to all of this, our children have learnt how to program a computer, use a map to orienteer, play tunes as a group on glockenspiels (no easy feat!) and master yet more spelling rules! Oaks Class have been working extremely hard this term with some exciting topics. English work has seen them exploring the story of The Iron Man by Ted Hughes. Children have been using many exciting writing techniques so that their stories are as gripping as possible. Every child has participated in sharing brilliant ideas and has produced excellent independent work that shows off their talent for sci-fi storytelling. In Science, they have been learning about sound. Lots of loud musical instruments and buzzers were needed to test their understanding of how we hear sound. It may have caused some headaches but it has been very enjoyable and interesting! In Art, the topic of sculpture has taken inspiration from Alberto Giacometti, Henry Moore, Auguste Rodin and more. The sketches and sculptures produced have shown how wonderfully the children are developing as creative thinkers and artists. Mighty Oaks Class have been writing diaries based on the expeditions of Scott and Shackleton to the South Pole and learning about the difficulties faced by both explorers. In Maths, the focus has been on calculating with fractions and the children have all been able to demonstrate a really sound understanding of these difficult concepts and have risen with enthusiasm to the challenge. We have just concluded our Science topic on materials (usually with very messy results). The Worship Council and School Council have been considering ways of developing a reflective, spiritual area in the playground. One of their ideas was to have prayers hanging on the tree. To help with this, Mr. Steve Hutchinson visited the school on 24th January, to lead a workshop where the children used pyrography to burn children's prayers onto slices of wood, which we hope to install soon. To round off a busy few weeks, Friday 11th February was "Wear your Scarf to School Day", where the children and staff were encouraged to wear their favourite scarf to school, to celebrate the end of Children's Mental Health Week, and to reinforce the values of Safety, Caring Achievement, Resilience and Friendship. Our PTA is always busy raising funds for the school, and we would like to thank them sincerely for their initiative and hard work. Please support their Cake and Jumble Sale to be held in the Bibury Village Hall on Saturday 5th March from 2pm to 4pm, where there will also be a Raffle with some exciting prizes, all in aid of the school. We wish our school community a happy and restful break over the half-term holiday.

BIBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Council Meeting, 8th February 2022

15 members of the public attended to express their unhappiness at not receiving notification of a planning application before the Parish Council discussed it at a meeting on 25th January 2022 as they were concerned about the noise, traffic and ecological issues which the development at Shoecraft Barn raised. The Clerk recommended that the most certain way of being notified of planning was to register with the CDC Planning portal to receive notifications via https://publicaccess.cotswold.gov.uk/online-applications/. The Parish Council agreed that the Clerk would write to The Planning Officer, to say that whilst they have already submitted their response, they wish to acknowledge the overwhelming strength of feeling against the proposals. At the time the Parish Council considered this application, most of the residents were not aware of the application, so their views were unknown.

Clerk's Report:

Thames Water: reply to our request as to how we could help reduce the overflow of sewage into the river in heavy rain conditions to reduce the need for tinkering. They are working

through plans to alleviate the problem but nothing has reached the costing stage yet. They feel residents use of rain and greywater capture with water butts etc is the most helpful remedy which residents can make.

Playground Repairs: Work will begin week beginning 14th February to repair/renew failing items.

Highways - Hawker's Hill: The road surface has deteriorated badly and the triangle at the top of the road has been eroded by turning vehicles. Cllr Chapman will meet with Highways to discuss amelioration and possible signage to deter unnecessary access, the costs involved may have to be funded 50/50 by the Parish Council.

Projected Major B 4425 Roadworks between 4th April – 18th July 2022: - The Street, Bibury - - The Vicarage to Arlington Pike - - The Vicarage to Kilkenny Cottage

21/04214/TCONTR Ablington Manor - Fell several Ash, Reduce Chestnut crown & fell 1 Chestnut.

22/00077/FUL &22/00078/LBC Ablington Manor – Roof investigation work including scaffolding, temporary removal of roof slate sections and temporary protective roof structure and associated works. Installation of temporary bat loft structure on garage roof. 21/04339/FUL 21 Aldsworth Road – Non material amendment re permission 21/00115/FUL to allow for materials to match.

22/00200/FUL & 22/00201/LBC William Morris – Proposed works to the rear garden including reconstruction of the garden retaining wall, drainage works, provision of a new stepped access to the garden, lowering of rear garden terrace, rebuilding of boundary walls with the strengthening of their foundations. Council supported but with a request that a close look at drainage was included.

Bibury Allotment Gardens: A request to CDC to restore these to Policy EN3 Local Green Spaces Item 1 as they are identified on the Conservation Map of Bibury which includes Cemetery Lane and Church Road.

Defibrillator - Agreement to purchase and install an unlocked metal cabinet defibrillator to replace the one near Rack Isle. It was agreed to defer this decision pending confirmation that it can be placed on the site of the existing one..

Wooden Litter Bins - Purchase was agreed for 3 wooden replacement bins & stub plates for Arlington Row, Batfield and Arlington Fields.

BIBURY GARDEN CLUB

There's been a change of plan for the March meeting. Bibury Gardening Club is delighted to announce that this will now be a talk by Mike Jones, head of the Royal Parks nursery in London, and nurseryman Martin Greaves. They will be telling us about the work that goes into growing plants for the spectacular bedding displays in the Royal parks and outside Buckingham Palace. This behind-the-scenes look at some of the most high-profile flower beds in the world promises to be fascinating, and we have extended an invitation to members of one of the Cirencester gardening clubs to come along as well. Club members who have bought red geraniums from George Blackwell in the past couple of years may know that these were grown by Martin for the Royal Parks nursery. The variety is chosen to match exactly the colour of the Guards' uniforms outside the palace and indeed their

nickname among club members is the "Buckingham Palace geraniums". Those who have been following the Downing Street "Partygate" saga may be interested to know that the Downing Street garden is also supplied with bedding by the Royal Parks. A member of the Downing Street staff is sent along to the nursery with a suitcase and ... no, I'm only kidding. It is true that the plants come from the Royal Parks nursery but they are delivered and planted in the normal way. Tickets for non-members will cost £2.50 and we will be serving wine and nibbles. If you are worried this means it might turn into a work event, could I please reassure you that it will be a bona fide garden club meeting. I hope it will be a very enjoyable one too. April's meeting sees the return of garden writer Vanessa Berridge, who will be talking about her latest book on the gardens at Borde Hill, near Haywards Heath in Sussex. In May we are hoping to visit Cerney House and Gardens, to see their display of tulips, and in June, Chipps Mann has agreed to let us tour her fabulous garden at Oxleaze Barn, near Lechlade. As spring approaches, we will be continuing with the occasional newsletter and advice, and as the season progresses there will be opportunities to buy or swap seedlings. The end of February and the beginning of March is always a testing time for impatient gardeners. We want to crack on, to sow seeds, to plant out. Yet all those checklists for what to do in the garden at this time of year aren't much good if it's blowing a gale outside or pouring with rain. Remember that gardening is a journey, so enjoy the trip and stop asking "Are we there yet?" Instead, if the weather allows, walk slowly round the garden before you start on any chores. Nancy Bumford (nee Smith)

The following was sent to us by Clare Beveridge about her Mother.

"Nancy was born in 1930 at the Reading Room in Bibury, which became the Village Hall in 1931. She was the second of seven children born to Albert and Dora Smith. The family moved up to The Pike when the new houses were built after the war. Nancy went to the local school and left when she was 14 to work at the Co-op in Bibury, she worked in the shop and helped deliver orders in the van. Nancy also worked for Bill Brown the local garage and taxi owner, she did housework, scrubbed floors and looked after the children.

In 1954 Nancy married Trevor Bumford whose parents lived at 21 The Square. Nancy and Trevor were married for 19 years and lived in Cirencester, they had three children, Clare, Alan and Louise. Nancy worked at both Bibury Court Hotel and The Swan Hotel as a waitress for many years in the '60's and '70's along wither her mother-in-law Maud.

Nancy loved Bibury, she was always returning, taking her grandchildren to visit the Trout Farm and for walks around the village. There have also been many family gatherings over the years at Bibury Football Club.

Sadly, after a short illness, at the age of 91, Nancy peacefully passed away on 13th January at home with her family."

Just a thought:

A note from the Bibury Planning Impact Group - Keeping people informed about local planning applications

A number of people in Bibury have expressed concern that they knew nothing about the planning application to turn the house known as Shoecroft barn (next to the Trout farm, and inside the Bibury Conservation Zone) into an 'events venue' until it was brought to their attention by concerned villagers.

Regional planning authorities such as Cotswold District Council (CDC) are only obliged to notify people in adjacent properties that a planning application has been received. They also fix an A4 typed sign to the property, and place a notice in a 'local newspaper'. Some people might consider that this is an inadequate approach when the application could affect people living much further away. In this case, an entire village.

In earlier times, the plans relating to local planning applications were routinely available for public inspection at the local Post Office. Nowadays they are on the Cotswold District Council (CDC) planning portal.

What can we and our local Parish Council do to improve the flow of planning information around the village so that potentially controversial plans can be identified in good time? Anyone can register to receive an alert from CDC whenever a planning application anywhere in our Parish is received. But that could result in a flood of information, mostly about routine small-scale works.

In the case of the Shoecroft Barn planning application, an informal group of villagers calling themselves Bibury Planning Impact Group (BPIG) has been spreading the word among the local community by telephone, email and leaflet.

There will undoubtedly be future occasions when the scale or nature of a planning application means it deserves broader local consultation. When this happens, villagers will want time to examine the plans carefully, and exercise their democratic rights to contribute views and concerns at Parish Council and District Council levels. They can only do that if they know about the planning application in the first place.

It's our village. We care about it. And we need to know in good time what's being planned for it.

Village Histories: 1864 - The tragic death of John Hill, carter

A salutary story about the dangers of drinking and (carriage) driving appeared in the Cirencester Times & Cotswold Advertiser on 28th November 1864.

There had been a fatal accident near Barnsley earlier in the month when a 39-year-old carter called John Hill died after falling under the wheels of his timber carriage. It was only during and after the Inquest, held at the Three Horse Shoes in Cirencester's Cricklade Street that the full story emerged.

Mr Hill was working for William Lock of Cirencester, who had sent him and another carter called Richard Gaytor to collect timber from Aldsworth. Their two timber carriages were laden with poles stacked so high that they were obliged to sit on top of the loads. Each carriage with its load weighed an estimated seven tons, according to one newspaper report. As they passed through Bibury they stopped at the Swan Inn, where they each had a quart of ale. Then they set off up the hill towards Arlington, but had only gone as far as the Catherine Wheel when they felt thirsty again, and stopped for another pint of ale each. In Barnsley they felt thirsty again, so they stopped at the Greyhound Inn and shared a pint of 'gin-hot'. I expect they were cold (it was November) and in need of a warming drink. Mr Gaytor then set off towards Cirencester, leaving Mr Hill in the Greyhound.

Given that the pair seemed unable to pass a pub without stopping for a drink, one can't help wondering if they might have started their pub crawl at the Sherborne Arms before they even left Aldsworth.

It was 5.30pm when Mr Hill left the village. It was probably already dark. He was probably feeling tired. A short way along the road he slipped off the timber, fell onto the road, and one of the carriage wheels ran over his arm. A Mr James Adams of Arlington, travelling the other way, had just passed Mr Hill when he heard the incident.

He went back and helped Mr Hill, who was able to stand up, saying: "I have got my arm broke". But despite medical attention in Cirencester, including amputation of the arm, he died a week later on 16th November. As the newspaper put it in the official language of the day: "Mortification set in, and fatal consequences ensued".

The verdict of the jury was accidental death. No official mention was made of the role that alcohol may have played in the accident, but the Coroner and Jury did ask Sergeant Eyles to make enquiries at the Greyhound Inn concerning how much alcohol Mr Hill had consumed.

Sgt Eyles interviewed the landlady (Mrs Habgood) and found that Mr Hill had spent two hours in the pub. Mrs Habgood stated that she had refused to serve him any more drink, whereupon he had tried asking other guests to order drinks for him.

It may be that the John Hill who died in this tragic accident was the same John Hill who a few years earlier had been fined five shillings for being drunk and disorderly in Cirencester. Maybe also the John Hill whose shoes were stolen when he was living at Day's Lodging House in Cricklade Street in 1857.

And perhaps it was the same John Hill who late one Friday evening in May 1855 was taken into custody after being spotted walking down Cirencester's Cricklade Street carrying a ladder. His excuse was that he had found it "leaning against a wall" near the entrance to the White Hart Inn yard.

It turned out to belong to the town's lamplighter, who was having a well-earned drink in the inn after his duties were over. At the hearing on the following Monday Mr Hill was given a reprimand and discharged, in the absence of any evidence that he had taken the ladder "with felonious intent". {Story from the Wilts and Gloucestershire Standard, 19th May 1855}. Footnote 1: What was 'gin-hot'. It seems that through the 1800s mixing gin with hot water was a popular way to drink it. But what was the ratio of gin to water? More research needed.

Footnote 2: Timber carriages were large four-wheeled, horse-drawn vehicles specifically designed to carry long timber loads ranging from a single massive tree trunk to multiple poles. They were massively strong, but without a load of timber on board looked rather like a skeletal frame on wheels.
