Lent has just begun, and although we tend to link the word with concepts such as dust and ashes, penitential, Jesus in the wilderness and self-reflection (all of which are true) the actual word lent simply derives from the word lengthen. The days are getting longer.

Don't get too excited, but spring is in the air.

Therefore, Lent is rightly a time of expectation and hope.

For Christians, the Lenten journey of more than 40 days and nights (Sundays don't count as fast days as they are the weekly celebration of God's love) passes through the darkness and bitterness of Good Friday before the joy of Easter, and this is a realistic and honest recognition that even times of hope and expectation have cost and pain.

And, with the media currently bubbling over with doom and gloom, conflict and anger, the reality is that hope can be in pretty short supply, and, if we are not careful, risks being a form of escapism rather than a sure hope that can weather the storms and failures that surround us.

So I was pleased to see that this year's Lent Book, as recommended by the Archbishop of Canterbury, is Bishop Emma Inneson's Failure: What Jesus said about sin, mistakes and messing stuff up.

I'm looking forward to reading it, but if a whole book sounds a bit intimidating, fear not. Those nice people from Church House in London have reduced the book to 40 bite sized pieces to make it easier. A page for each day of Lent. There are copies available either directly from me, or from each of our three churches.

What Bishop Emma seeks to explore is the inevitability of failure and the need for honesty in handling it. What she avoids is the simplistic self help book approach of 'Failure being the natural prelude to success'. Whilst this can be true, and it is certainly the case that we achieve nothing without lots of mess ups along the way, the fact is that failure is normal, whilst success (By whatever assessment you choose to use) is not. She therefore seeks to explore failure as part of the warp and whoof of being human, and how we might best handle it. Particularly in a world that has a strange reluctance to be honest about failure.

Grab a copy and let me know what you make of it` with every blessing

Springtime brings so many things to be thankful for, not only the beauty of plants erupting into leaf and flower, on these longer days we see signs of new life everywhere, we are so very lucky to live in this beautiful place.

They say March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb. Ewe could say it leaves sheepishly......

Whatever the weather this March we cannot fail to be cheery about the Daffodils their bright yellow trumpets proclaim a new season, a small fragrant bunch type Daffodil (Narcissus tazetta) grow abundantly all over the Holy land and are referred to in many verses in the bible some by name and others like in Mathew 6 just as wildflowers. BIBURY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

The teachers and pupils have had a very busy start to the school year, with the new term being packed with learning, events and activities. The whole school had a cookery day, where the children made delicious afternoon tea, which was enjoyed with some members of our local community. Acorns Class: This month, Acorn Class have enjoyed visiting our new Forest School site just over the river. There is plenty to explore at this large site and we are already seeing the benefits of greater outdoor learning opportunities for our youngest children. In English, we have all been using the story "The Way Back Home" as a stimulus for writing. Early Years have begun to write their own sentences using their phonics and Years 1 and 2 have been crafting their own adventure story this morning. In Science, we have been busy finding out about which parts of the plant we can eat, growing our own salad and learning about healthy diets. Meanwhile in Geography we have been learning about the environment around Bibury and comparing it to different environments across the world (The Amazon Rainforest, Timbuktu in Mali and large international cities such as Beijing in China). Acorn Class enjoyed our whole school skipping session with Skip2Bfit, even the teachers joined in! Oaks Class: Over the last few weeks, Oaks and Mighty Oaks have been learning about Climate and Weather. We have recently discussed and looked at Polar, Desert and Tropical regions across the world. We will continue to explore different characteristics of these regions and also begin to look at our own climate, looking at our temperate climate in the UK. Oaks class have been looking at 'What does it mean to be a Hindu in Britain today?'. So far this term, we have explored Hinduism by looking at their beliefs and teachings about aims and duties in their religion. We have also discussed how their religion is an important part of Hindu life, and looked at how people express their faith within their own homes by using a puja and shrine. Mighty Oaks Class: In science, we have been learning about how traits are inherited from our parents and ancestors. We have explored Darwin's theory of evolution and this has led us to look at the way that plants and animals are able to survive in different environments because of their adaptations. This work has linked very closely with our RE topic, where we are considering whether science and faith are in conflict over the story of creation. In mathematics, year 5 have just finished a unit of work looking at efficient methods for multiplication and division, whilst year 6 have been working on ratio and proportion. Swimming is coming to a close at the end of this term and we have been delighted to see the progress of all children in their strokes and confidence as swimmers.

- · Contested Elections will take place on Thursday 4th May 2023 if there are more than 7 candidates. If there are 7 candidates or less then the Election will be "Uncontested".
- · Bibury Annual Meeting of the Parish Council to be held on Tuesday 16th May 2023 commencing at 6.30pm. The first order of business will be to 'Elect a Chairman'.

VOTER ID for Elections

From May 2023 individuals who wish to vote in person, including those acting as a proxy on behalf of another individual, will be required to produce an accepted form of photographic ID to prove their identity before they will be issued with a ballot paper. This is a national change implemented by the Government as part of the Elections Act 2022 which councils are required to follow when running elections.

Those voting in person must bring a suitable form of photographic ID to their polling station. The most commonly used IDs include:

- Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- Photographic driver's licence issued by the UK, Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (including provisional)
- · European Economic Area (EEA) photographic ID Card
- · UK Biometric Residence Permit
- · An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (PASS card)
- · A Blue Badge
- A concessionary travel pass funded by HM Government or local authority

For more information on which forms of photo ID will be accepted, visit electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID or call their helpline on 0800 328 0280.

Voters who do not produce valid identification or a Voter Authority Certificate (more information below), will not be allowed to vote.

Only original documents will be accepted. You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you. The name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote.

If you do not have one of the accepted forms of photo ID, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate from the Council. `Details at https://voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk/

Friday 5th May: Kicking off the weekend will be a charity dinner party in the historic schoolroom at Arlington Baptist Church, in aid of the Church and Bibury PTA. This will be an elegant event ... think round tables, white linen, table decorations by Bibury Gardening Club, aperitifs, classy dining (three courses and coffee). There will be only seven tables, each seating eight people, so early application is advised. Tickets from info@arlingtonbaptist.org.uk cost £30. The evening starts at 7.00 for 7.30pm. Carriages at 10.30pm.

The Big Street Party on Saturday 6th May. This will take place in Church Road, which will be closed to vehicles for the day. In true street-party style, we invite you all to bring along the food of your choice, and share it with your neighbours and friends. We'll provide the tables, chairs and entertainers.

All the fun of the fete: After the street party lunch, the entertainment will continue in the adjacent gardens of Church House, where we are planning a village fete with all the attractions you'd expect – musicians, stalls, games, refreshments.

Car parking nearby: Don't worry about carrying your food & drink to and from the Street Party venue. The owners of Bibury Court Farm Field (a short walk from the church) are kindly allowing people attending the Street Party and Village Fete to park their cars there.

Watch the Coronation on the Big Screen: The full ceremony will be screened in Bibury Village Hall as it happens on the Saturday morning, and depending on demand will be shown again during the afternoon.

Coronation Raffle: Through Saturday, tickets will be sold for the raffle, and the draw will take place later in the afternoon. One of the top prizes will be a voucher for up to five people to go on a personal tour of the Classic Motor Hub. Another prize just announced is a Prosecco afternoon tea for two people ... served in your own home!

Time to get walking again!

With Spring on its way we start to think about getting out to walk in the beautiful English countryside again, but where to find new and interesting walks?

Mr Boswell Belcher of Arlington (1851-1913)

By the late 1880s Arlington and Bibury had a whole range of retail businesses that together provided almost everything a village family would need. Prominent among them was the Post Office, general supply store and butchers shop run by the Belcher family in the premises nowadays occupied by The Twig and Go Wild & Co.

Thanks to Jean Wright I have been able to study a newsletter produced by Olivia Belcher, proprietor, in late 1896. Described as an 'Almanack' this offers some fascinating insights into what the village store of that era was likely to stock. As well as groceries and provisions, Olivia sold drapery such as 'hats, caps, woollen wraps, flannels, flannelettes, blankets and sheets'. She described herself as 'grocer and draper' in her 1891 census return. Olivia was also the local agent for the London & Lancashire Fire Assurance Company.

The Post Office and the butchery business were the responsibility of Olivia's brother Lancelot. He was the Postmaster. There were two daily mail deliveries (6.15am and 6pm) and two despatches (11.20am and 7.15pm). Those were the days, eh?

On the butchery side, Lancelot was offering 'ox, beef and down* mutton of the finest quality, pickled tongues, pickled hams and corned beef, and prime home-made lard' He stressed that his beef, mutton, pork and other joints were 'English meat only, and of a quality that you may enjoy a right Merry Christmas'.

Also in the Almanack are (probably) paid-for advertisements from Arlington traders. These included Thomas Turner (Bibury & Arlington Mills, 'all kinds of corn ground and bruised at the shortest notice'), Edmund Mills (shoeing and general smith), James Cullerne (boot & shoe maker & repairer), Ernest Randell (baker & flour dealer) Cornelius Miles (carrier to Cirencester) and Walter Field (carpenter, wheelright and land measurer).

Not mentioned in the Almanack, but quite probably the man who produced it, was their brother Boswell. The initials BB after the three-page article about the history of Bibury and Arlington villages betray the fact that this was certainly his work.

In fact, Boswell was well known throughout Gloucestershire on account of the articles he contributed to newspapers on scientific, antiquarian and archeological themes. That was just his hobby. His day job, as it were, was helping in the Belcher's family business. And it was in the course of that work that he unexpectedly passed away one day in early June 1913.

He was in Ablington taking grocery orders for the shop. It was a Monday morning. As usual he had breakfasted that day on a boiled egg, bread and butter and tea. He arrived in Ablington at 8.30, and one of his first calls was to the cottage of Clara Miles, a shepherd's wife. In what must have been a traumatic experience for Mrs Miles, Boswell was literally standing on her doorstep, notebook in hand, when he gave a sigh, collapsed and died.

The Public Enquiry a few days later listened to evidence from the unfortunate Mrs Miles, as well as from Boswell's widow, brother and doctor. After hearing that he had experienced chest pains a few weeks earlier, the jury concluded that his death was due to natural causes, probably a heart attack. He had been just a few days short of his 62nd birthday. The Cheltenham Chronicle reported all this in its 7th June 1913 issue, under the heading 'His last order'.

The funeral service and burial took place at Arlington Baptist Church. The congregation learnt that earlier in his life, Boswell had lived and worked in Canada for a while. He was described as having a 'gentle and kind disposition and won the hearts of everyone he came into contact with'. He left a widow, two daughters and a son.





Produce section – Beetroots, Carrots and Shallots

Now that the milder weather is here and the soil is warming up, it is time to think about growing those prize-winning carrots, beetroots and shallots.

- Carrots take up little space, and can even be grown in containers. Sow seed regularly from early spring onwards.
- Beetroot is easy and quick to grow from seed, making it an ideal crop for beginners.
 Will yours be the traditional dark purple variety or one of the orange, yellow or pink cultivars.
- Shallot sets are becoming available in garden centres and can be planted from mid-March to mid-April.

Photography section -Farm animals' category

If you are planning a trip to Adam Henson's Cotswold Farm Park with your children or grandchildren, make sure you have your camera to hand.

Hints and Tips for capturing that winning shot

- Be patient. Let the animals get used to you being there and wait for the moment when they do something worth capturing.
- Think animal portrait. Aim for a shot where the personality of the animal comes through.
- Crouch down. When photographing smaller animals like chickens or lambs, get down to their level.
- Indoor shots. Avoid using flash as this can spook animals in enclosed surroundings.
- Keep shooting. The beauty of digital cameras is that you can rattle off lots of shots until you get a decent one.
- Crop before printing. Too much going on can detract from the story you are trying to tell, so don't be afraid to zoom in on the area you want to print.
