

Dear Friends,

We returned, a few days ago, from our trip to Israel, and I observed, at the time, that the thing that really struck me on this trip was the extent to which one's experience of almost anything is shaped by the people you share it with. Almost everywhere we went, I had been to before. But I was seeing it through the eyes of others this time, meaning that my experience was richer, fuller, different.

This is what Matthew Syed is pointing out in his lovely book Rebel Ideas. The wider the range of experiences that we bring to the table, the better our solution to a problem is likely to be. If I only mix with those who see like me, I will be hugely handicapped.

This week the Paul Hobbs Exhibition opens at Bibury, and once again we are invited to see through the eyes of someone else. We are invited to see the world differently. This will inevitably be a slightly uncomfortable experience, but we will always be the richer for it.

In recent years, our youngest daughter has taught me to see the world through the eyes of painters, a truly invigorating experience. And, as you, are probably aware, my meat and drink, is seeing through the eyes of writers, as I find this is the way that I most naturally slip out of my own shoes and into the shoes of another.

In Israel, we were all struck by the range of responses to the Holy sites. For some, being in the place. Touching the very stones, walking the very steps, was everything. For others it was less about where Jesus had been, and more about places hallowed by prayer filled centuries. For yet others, place was unimportant as Jesus dwells with us today wherever we are.

But the important thing is that none of these positions hold a monopoly on spiritual truth. I have absolutely no right to stand in judgement on someone whose experience is different to mine. Indeed the challenge and opportunity is to enter into the experience of another and to draw from their very different experience.

On a more mundane level I may never learn to love jazz or the blues, but I can hope to learn from, and see through the eyes of those that do. And in so doing become richer and more connected to others. We left for Israel as the Coronation was still being celebrated and so I do one to use this page of Village Life to express enormous gratitude to Angela and Roger Staton, and the whole Coronation team for all of their hard work in bringing the village together in celebration. Good things require effort... with every blessing Tim

BIBURY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

A very special village school, serving Bibury and the surrounding villages.

Bibury children joined in with Coronation celebrations, making crowns that they wore to church and displayed for others to enjoy. The children have been hard at work on some fantastic maypole dances that they showcased to friends and family. Here is a little snippet of what our classes have been up to:



Acorn Class - Acorn Class have been busy writing stories in the present tense using the book, Traction Man as a stimulus. The children have created some excellent stories in their independent writing sessions.

We have had visits from young animals too this month, Mrs Spring's puppy and a box of lambs thanks to Mr Emmerson. The children enjoyed meeting our guests and very much enjoyed feeding the lambs their milk.

In Geography we have been learning about some of the wonders of the world including the tallest mountain in the world, Mount Everest. We found out that bar-headed geese fly over the top of the mountain at 10, 000m - that's as high as a jet plane!

EYFS are enjoying their new learning space which is smart, bright and well-resourced. Having their own dedicated space means that their learning area is quieter and completely dedicated to their needs whilst providing easy access to the outdoor learning area. We feel very lucky to be benefitting from this investment in our school facilities.

Oaks Class - In History, Oaks and Mighty Oaks have just started to explore the Anglo-Saxon period. We have investigated who they are, where they sit on our timeline and considered why they came to Britain. We will continue by examining archaeological evidence and written evidence from the time to provide context for the archaeological finds and learn the importance them. By the end of term, Oaks and Mighty Oaks will be considering whether the period deserves to be called the 'Dark Ages'.

Oaks have been thinking about the Day of Pentecost and how Christians believe that after Jesus returned to be with God the Father, He sent the Holy Spirit at Pentecost to help the Church to make Jesus' invisible Kingdom visible by living lives that reflect the love of God. As a class, we have explored a range of emotions which could have been felt during this period, specifically the emotions of Jesus's disciples. To explore and explain these emotions, Oaks have recently created an emotions graph to represent the disciple's feelings starting from the day Jesus died to Pentecost.

Mighty Oaks Class: In English, we have been reading Michael Morpurgo's 'Beowulf' and the children are writing their own version of a part of this legend. This ties in with their learning about the Anglo-Saxons in history.

We are working on a project called 'Holy Ground' with the conceptual artist, Paul Hobbs, whose art exhibition is at the church. The children are interviewing people in the community about their Christian faith and their project will also be on display in the church.

Our Christian value for this term is service, which ties in really well with the Young Leaders' Award, where the children will be soon be deciding upon a community project that they will work on. This award, provided by the Archbishop of York Trust, encourages children to become courageous advocates – also one of the aims of our school vision.

A big well done to all of our Year 6 who have completed their SATS this month. We are so proud of you all.

Notes from Meeting of 16th May 2023. The meeting was greatly enhanced by the Clerk who had prepared teas & coffees for the break between the Annual Parish Meeting and the workaday Annual Meeting of the Parish Council – she had also brought biscuits!

The three new Councillors were welcomed to join the four returning Councillors. Our Ward Councillor David Fowles and our County Councillor Lisa Spivey were also at the meeting. Craig Chapman was reelected as Chairman for the coming year. The gallery of Councillors now looks like this:

TRO (Traffic Regulation Order)

The Public Consultation for parking Traffic Regulation Order will commence on 25th May 2023, closing on 16th June 2023. The information will be available to view on the GCC website from this date and a link will be set up from Bibury Parish Council's website. Notices will be erected on site in readiness for the consultation start date.

We are progressing the offer of trialling an ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) camera which will note speeds of traffic coming into Arlington on the B4425 as a deterrent to speeding.

PLANNING:

Barn House, Hawker's Hill, Arlington: No objections.

Bibury Trout Farm, Arlington: No objections were raised.

ISSUES RAISED:

Mirror opposite Arlington Farm Road: It was noted that this needs to be improved as it was very dangerous to join the main road without sight of traffic coming uphill.

ROSPA Inspection of Play Area: This raised only issues which were already in hand.

Tributes we're paid to Ray Theodoulou who had represented us with such energy for many years as our CDC representative. David Fowles has taken on the role and reported the make-up of CDC is: Liberal Democrats now have 22 seats on the council, Conservatives 9, Greens 2 and Independents 1.

BIBURY GARDENING CLUB

I'll be quite glad to see the back of May. Yes, there were lots of exciting things happening – our Coronation celebrations for example – but the weather was relentlessly cold and/or wet. Normally by now we've had a couple of warm spells, but this year we've had to wait until the end of May for a good dose of spring sunshine.

If you look at the statistics, the May that's just gone wasn't notably colder compared to the UK average. However, the lack of any real warmth kept overnight temperatures as low as 5C (41F) and stopped plants putting on growth.

The advice from experienced gardeners is not to plant anything tender (such as geraniums and fuchsias) until the risk of frost is over.

This often seems frustrating to the novice gardener, who wants to rush out and fill their pots and containers with colourful summer bedding, but think of it this way. If that small plant was a small kitten or puppy, you wouldn't put it out on a cold night, would you? Plants get stressed by adverse weather conditions just as we do – even more so, because they can't run away and find shelter somewhere. Wildflowers, like the weather, set their own agenda. A forecast of thunderstorms meant we had to call off our visit to Wendy Challinor's garden on 10 May, but it is rescheduled for Wednesday 14 June at 6.30pm. Let's hope the sun shines and the wildflowers are looking spectacular.

On 12 July, the garden club will be visiting Brockworth Court, the home of Tim and Bridget Wiltshire, who open their garden for the National Gardens Scheme. It's really a series of gardens, which surround a historic manor house, and a tithe barn which is used for weddings.

The earliest part of the house dates from the 14th century and it was once visited by Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn. The garden is featured on the Great British Gardens website for Gloucestershire if anyone wants to have a sneak preview. We'll be meeting at the house at 6.30pm, and there is plenty of parking.
