### **BIBURY, BARNSLEY AND WINSON CHURCHES**

Dear Friends.

This week I found myself reading a book that irritated me, and I'm not sure why. Called *Fake History*, by the unlikely named Otto English (Real name Andrew Scott – I guess that the pseudonym is ironic) It tells of ten great lies and How They Shaped the World. Ranging from *Winston Churchill was Britain's Greatest Prime Minister* to *Curry comes from India* via *Hitler was a Failed Artist* it purports to debunk great fake narratives of history to demonstrate how we justify present political or moral certainties, using fake history (Or false heuristics if you want to be clever about it) And the thing is that I agree with most of what he says, even if I reckon that he was peddling his own rather obvious political agenda based on his own very particular reading of history.

When he quotes Mark Twain's words *Its easier to fool people, than to convince them that they have been fooled.* I shout: here, here (Even though Mark Twain never actually said that). When he quotes David Dunning of the Dunning-Kruger effect: *People who lack knowledge, lack the knowledge to realise they lack the knowledge, Again, I agree.* 

When he quotes the compulsory preface of Sellars and Yateman's classic *1066 and All That*: *History is not what you thought. It is what you can remember.* I smile in affirmation. So why the irritation? As you might have guessed, Otto thinks that Trump supporters, and everyone who voted for Brexit, suffer from an overdose of fake history. But I don't think that that's why he annoys me.

Otto is also guilty of gross simplifications and historical misreadings that reveal that he is as guilty of peddling fake history as anyone else. But that's not it either. So maybe its because he seems to assume that fake history, or to give it a more acceptable name, a narrative to live by, is, of itself wrong. We all tell stories. They give our lives shape and meaning. But Otto seems to think that there is a single version of history. And that is where he's wrong.

Laurent Binet's brilliant and subtly nuanced novel HHhH (Short for Heydrich is Himmler's brain) gives us a fascinating insight into the writing of a historical novel about the assassination of Gestapo Chief, Reinhard Heydrich. He shows that every step that the writer makes, in drawing his account together alters the final destination of the book. Every inclusion or omission of a fact. Every choice or change of words, makes a statement, and changes meaning. The idea that there is a single correct version of history is daft. In spite of the Great historian, Geoffrey Elton's, attempt to argue that history is the purest search for truth.

It's a lovely theory, but an impossible one to live out. That said, there is daft, there is inaccurate, and there is plain deceitful. (For example, Donald Trump's father was not born in 'a very wonderful place in Germany'. He was born in New York.) So, I do have an issue with Otto on philosophical grounds, whilst still agreeing with much of what he said. We are all guilty of cognitive dissonance. Which is just a fancy way of saying that we all just make facts fit our story with incredible ease, and ignore those that are simply too stubborn to be reshaped. Its part of being human.

So why the irritation? I think its because Otto seems a bit pleased with himself. The thrust of his argument is how stupid everyone else is. Whilst clever old Otto, can look down upon us mere simpletons. I'm not sure that that is either fair or true. We are all searching for a narrative that makes sense of our lives. Otto's has opted for a secular, liberal and progressive pardigm. And that is fine. But it also happens to be only one option. Otto struggles to understand how anyone could disagree with him or, with integrity, hold a different view.

And that suggests that he doesn't really understand people very well. We all need stories. And as CS Lewis showed stories ae as true as historical facts. **With every blessing**

### Traffic and Parking Issues in Arlington / Bibury

As a number of Parishioners have commented (and we are all well aware) the traffic and parking situation has significantly worsened over this Summer period particularly around the area of the Trout Farm, River Coln Bridge and the Swan Hotel.

The Parish Council is well aware of the unacceptable issues presented by unreasonable and illegal parking, by both cars and coaches, with resultant road congestion / blockages and visibility issues creating unsafe driving conditions. A number of actions will be put in place via the Traffic Regulation Order (see Parish Council website - TRO), with a final assessment taking place following the latest community consultation.

Key to such new measures however, and with respect to existing measures, is the need for **adequate enforcement** and I would encourage you to contact:

### What links Bibury to a freighter torpedoed in 1940?

One day this summer I was browsing through postcards of old Bibury for sale on ebay, when I had a surprise. After endless pics of Arlington Row, Arlington Mill and The Swan Inn, what appeared next was a photo of a large cargo ship.

It wasn't a posting error. According to a hand-written note on the reverse of the postcard, the photo was of a 4,600-ton freighter called the 'Bibury', built in Glasgow in 1929, and owned by Alexander Shipping Co. The note also stated that she was 'lost' in September 1940.

Reference to a website called 'uboat.net' confirmed that she was indeed a casualty of the war in the Atlantic. She had been sailing from Cardiff and Milford Haven to Buenos Aires with a cargo of 7,500 tons of coal. Two days into the voyage she was hit by two torpedoes.

She sank in just five minutes, with the loss of all 37 crew, the gunner and the captain. Three weeks later the body of one of the crew was washed ashore at Tobermory in Scotland.

The steam-powered vessel was owned by Alexander Capper & Co (also known as Alexander Shipping Co Ltd). At first I wondered if there may have been some connection between the ship's owners and the village of Bibury. However, the explanation for the ship's name turned out to be rather more prosaic.

The company routinely named its ships after English placenames ending in '...bury'. Others included Kingsbury, Ledbury, Newbury and Thornbury. So the connection between the ship and our village was simply the fact that the village name fitted the owners' naming scheme.

I thought that was the end of Bibury's shipping connection. But it wasn't. In 1946 a new 'SS Bibury' appeared. It wasn't the same ship, of course, just the same name.

This ship had started in life as the 6,400-ton 'Empire Ballad', built in Sunderland for the Ministry of War Transport in 1941/2. She survived wartime convoy work, and in 1946 was sold off. The buyer, of course, was Alexander Shipping Co Ltd, who promptly renamed her the 'SS Bibury'.

The vessel carried this name until 1951 when Alexander sold her. She changed hands several times during the next 18 years, each time acquiring a new name, finally sailing as 'Poseidon' (nothing to do with the 1972 disaster movie of the same name, as far as I know).

The ship that was once called Bibury came to an ignominious end in 1969, when she ran aground and was scrapped.

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### **COUNTRY SIGHTINGS**

This year seems to have been a good year for the Humming Bird Hawk Moth, as well as many wasps nests, and a Kestrel who likes the garden bird table to perch on – or the electric cable overhead. Sparrows have long done a runner, but it's nice to see 2 or 3 lots of nearly half grown Rabbits! **Roger King**
