Dear Friends,

Hands up, who has read Five Minutes Peace by Jill Murphy. Can you believe that it was first published in 1986? That's 37 years ago. Go the other way, and it's 1949 and Clement Attlee is busy sorting out post-war Britain and empire. We watched an Inspector Morse last night, a Sunday evening treat as a young curate couple in Oxford. That came out in 1988. It seemed ancient. All those perms, and pubs with closing times. But I digress.

*Five Minutes Peace*. It was a favourite with parents, more than children, I suspect, as Mrs Large searches for a brief break from the rumbustious energy of her lovely children. Jill Murphy clearly had a thing about peace, since her first book, *Peace at Last*, was about Mr Bear escaping his wife's snoring. And *All in one Piece* (a neat homophone) is about Mrs Large trying to escape from the chaos of home, for a night out with her husband.

Since Jill Murphy moved to Cornwall, where she died two years ago aged 72, I think that it is likely that she sought peace.

Most of do. Some in small doses, some in large. But most of us crave a degree of peace. But we really don't help ourselves. IPads and iPhones really do not help, so why do so many people take them to bed with them?

Headmaster, journalist, political historian and university vice chancellor Sir Anthony Seldon's *The Path of Peace* tells the story of his own personal search for peace following the death of his wife. A period when his utterly full-on existence (he required two personal assistants such was his relentless drive and work ethic) finds him homeless and jobless. He walks 'No Man's Land' from Switzerland to the English Channel, reflecting on the peace that the *Great War* was meant to achieve, and the yearning for peace amongst the combatants, notably Douglas Gillespie who proposed the creation of a via Sacra, memorial road, along no man's land.

Where is peace to be found at this busy. Exhausting time of year?

One of Jesus's Christmas titles is Prince of Peace, appropriated from the messianic prophecy of Isaiah: *He will be called wonderful counsellor, Mighty God, Prince of Peace.* 

So, if Jesus brings peace this Christmas how come peace remains so elusive?

Peace, shalom, is more than the absence of war. It is the ability to live at peace with the world, with people, with nature, with God. But how am I to be 'at peace' if others do not seek peace? Or their idea of peace is not the same as mine? How is peace to be found in Israel and Ukraine?

Part of the answer is contained in the heart of Christmas because Jesus brings peace, enabling us to be at peace with God.

But being at peace with ourselves and with others can be much harder, and whilst it is rarely found in escape, it does require a determination on our part to set aside time to enter into it.

Soldier, explorer. Geographer, priest and hermit, Charles de Foucauld, murdered in 1916 in Algeria, wrote these words: *I do not want a monastery that is too secure. I want to live the contemplative life along the streets. If you cannot go to the desert you must make the desert in your life. Live the intimacy of God in the noise of the city.* 

Recently canonised, de Foucauld didn't have Mrs Large's four boisterous children, but I think that he was on to something. Peace can be found in the heart of war (and family life) and amazingly we can be the bringers of peace.

May you know the peace of Christ this Christmas,

#### **COUNTRY WATCH**

Our regular visitors, the Field Fares, have been spotted locally – are these the first signs of winter?

It has been sadly reported that RSPCA Oak and Furrows in Cricklade have experienced such a large increase in animals being admitted that it has had to make the difficult decision not to take any more for the time being. They currently have over 90 hedgehogs in their care!

If you find wildlife in need, visit www.helpwildlife.co.uk to find alternative wildlife rescues, or contact your nearest vet for Wildlife First Aid. Piles of leaves are ideal for sleeping hedgehogs, so leave a few piles around, to help them.

#### **BIBURY PARISH COUNCIL**

Notes from the meeting held on 14th November 2023. There were no members of the public present to hear the following discussed: District Councillor David Fowles told us that telephone access to CDC will be reduced to access before 2.00pm in the hope of savings of £100,000 a year. There is opposition to this and the implications are being investigated. The 'missing link' is now on target although 2,000 adders have been found on site and they are a protected species. The proposed truck stop has been turned down by planning department and there are discussions about it being put by the old cattle market. Plans for a new surgery at Tetbury have gone through although it is more development on a green field site. There was discussion about possible grantors for Village purposes, ie Rural Prosperity Fund and Build Back Better fund, and double glazing windows in the Village Hall was raised as a possible ambition.

Highways Report: The group investigating parking issues had met with members of the police, Highways, County & District Councillors, County Council Parking Services and had a very helpful meeting with action plans made to progress better controls. In parish discussions on this the problem of emissions relating to all the traffic in The Street & around the bridge were discussed; it will certainly be confronted in our biodiversity considerations. £750 was given to the Parish Council from the filming group who will spend 5 hours in Arlington Row on Tuesday 21st November and then in Ablington.

The village sign at The Pike which blocks the view when turning onto the B4425 has been re-sited but needs further refining. The Arlington Row scheme for reducing run-off in rainy conditions raised the question of gulley clearing which would be required at regular intervals and Highways Dept will only accept

someone whose business is fully insured; there is the possibility that there is someone locally who meets the criteria. Planning Applications: All the plans before us were supported by the Parish Council: Garnes Barn, Ablington; Cotteswold House, Arlington, Grove Barn, Salt Way and tree works at Bridge House, Ablington. There was discussion regarding 11 Arlington Row where activities are taking place without planning permission on a listed building. Public Toilets: CDC are considering closing 2 of the 4 toilets during the winter months; councillors did not agree that the footfall in Bibury reduced sufficiently in those months to warrant closure and the payment of 50p for their use should offset maintenance costs.

#### **BIBURY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL**

We are excited to tell you that every Monday afternoon 2.30pm-3pm, we are holding a free story time session for children that are under school age.

0-4 year old children are welcome to attend with an accompanying carer. Children may borrow story sacks or picture books each week and the session will be led by teaching staff in our EYFS room. If you would like to come along, please telephone the school office to book a place.

Acorns Class have had a busy month. In Geography we have been learning about the changing seasons and how the different seasons bring different weather, we have been learning about weather forecasts as well as how weather differs across the United Kingdom.

This month Acorn Class have spent some time with Wren Class at North Cerney. We have had joint English and Maths lessons working together on letters, poems and lots of Maths problems. It is wonderful to watch both sets of children enjoying each other's company every week and helping each other to learn.

Oaks Class have been busy building sentences to our narrative story 'Bike Boy'. They have used a range of writing techniques to engage the reader, for example, they have used pathetic fallacy, metaphors, similes, kennings and personification to really extend their stories. In the next few days, Oaks will begin to independently plan their own story of a young child growing up and heading into the big, wide world.

Mighty Oaks Class: In science, we have continued our work on forces. We considered which type of string would provide the quickest route for messages carried by balloon and found that kite string had the least friction, with the balloon travelling along this the most quickly. We have also investigated water resistance by changing the shapes of plasticine and found out how levers can be used to reduce the amount of effort needed to lift a load.

Bikeability Years 5 & 6 have enjoyed earning their Bikeability Badges. You may have seen the children out in the village on their bicycles learning about how to be safe on the roads. We are pleased to say that all children passed the course. We have spaces in all year groups, please help to spread the word about our wonderful school and direct interested parties to the school office to arrange a visit.



#### News in brief: from the archives

1882: In the late 1800s James Arkell, a pillar of the local community, ran the grocery store in Bibury. It was on The Street, just before the road turns left away from the river to climb the hill towards Aldsworth.

In November 1882 he applied for a licence to sell petroleum. This was big news for Bibury, and was reported in the Wilts and Gloucestershire Standard (18 November 1882). In those days petrol was sold in cans.

Supt. Wood reported that he had examined the premises and found them suitable for the purpose. The application was granted, and the Chairman concluded by advising Mr Arkell to 'be careful with the stuff'.

1923: At Fairford Petty Sessions in July 1923 a motor lorry driver called William Bradley, of Bermondsey, was fined the maximum penalty of £5 for driving a heavy lorry with trailer attached at a speed exceeding eight miles per hour on the Aldsworth to Bibury road. A shocked Police Sergeant Hastings stated that the defendant had actually driven over a measured mile 'at the rate of 13 miles per hour'.

From the report in the Gloucester Journal of 14th July 1923 there was evidently much tut-tutting about the nuisance caused by heavy lorries exceeding the speed limit. Supt. J A Price stated that considering the class of lorry the defendant was driving, the relevant speed limit was actually 5mph.

I must say I would have liked a few more details in the press report. What make of lorry? Were the lorry and trailer loaded? If so, with what? What was the driver's destination? What was the purpose of his trip? Exactly how had the police measured his speed?

1941: On 14th June the Cheltenham Chronicle reported that a pig club had been started in Bibury for the parishes of Bibury, Barnsley and Winson. Mr C J Taylor was honorary secretary, and Mr E C Bartlett assistant honorary secretary. The club was affiliated to the Gloucestershire Pig and Potato Production Committee.

These local pig clubs were widespread during the 1939 war, encouraged (and controlled) by the Government at a time when commercially farmed pigs were in short supply because of imported grain shortages.

Each pig club could have up to 25 members, who would acquire and look after a piglet, sharing the duties of looking after it and feeding it on kitchen scraps. In due course, the resulting meat would be shared among the members.

According to a piece in The Oldie (March 2019) There was even a national co-ordinating body – the Small Pig Keeper's Council.

Giles's lecture on gardening for shade was entitled The Bombproof and the Beautiful, and he showed us more than 100 slides featuring plants that ranged from shad-tolerant toughies like hellebores and hostas through to exotic characters such as the gorgeous blue Himalayan poppy and cobra lilies (Arisaema) which look as if they would only grow in a conservatory but are hardy in the UK.

If I had to show slides of my own shade-gardening, it would probably be called The Cautious and the Cowardly, since I tend to stick to tried and tested plants rather than being a bit more adventurous. My takeaway from Giles's lecture was to make a New Year's resolution to be more adventurous in the garden and grow something I haven't grown before. It's something we should all do – pushing yourself out of your comfort zone is good for the brain and the soul.

Next month's meeting, on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> December, is at 3.30pm in the Old Schoolrooms at the Baptist Church. It's our Christmas party, so there will be seasonal games, a quiz, and a raffle with a wildlife theme, inspired by our talk from Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust speaker Fergus Dignan.
