Dear Friends,

I couldn't quite understand the funny looks I was receiving on the train the other day. But eventually the penny dropped. I was dressed (Highly unusually) in a dog collar, and the book that I was so engrossed in had the catchy title: Erotic Vagrancy. I could have tried to point out that the title was actually a quote from Pope John XXIII, who was expressing deep disquiet about the very public adulterous relationship being conducted in Rome between Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton on the set of Cleopatra in the early 1960's. And that the book by the intriguing author, Roger Lewis is a delight, seeking to explore Taylor and Burton's life, relationship and character through the medium of their films and performances, and, along the way revealing his love affair with both Taylor and Burton and the vulgar, gaudy 60's and 70's. Cleopatra, as he shows was no historical epic for all its sets and costumes. It was all about Rome in the 1960's. But the damage was already done.

Lewis's knowledge of cinema is encyclopaedic and gossipy, and the book's length is a result of his inability to resist sharing fascinating facts, anecdotes and bitchy comments. (When a vast a violent fire breaks out in Beverly Hills and destroys the homes of both Zsa Zsa Gabor and Walter Wagner – the producer of Cleopatra – Noel Coward observes in his diary: all of which goes to prove that God's in his heaven and not just sitting there either) Or the comment of movie mogul, Darryl Francis Zanuck – Don't say yes until I've finished talking. Or Marlene Dietrich's comment when the Burtons complained about the fans besieging the Copley-Plaza in Boston where they were staying – My dear Richard, my dear Elizabeth if you want to escape the crowds, don't stay in the same hotel as me.

But for all of the wit, and caustic humour the book is really a tragedy.

Both Burton and Taylor, but Burton above all, seemed to spend their lives pressing the self-destruct button, their days and nights governed by seemingly uncontrollable passions. Or, in the world of Gabor Mate, the brilliant Canadian expert on stress, trauma and addiction: They were addicts.

Both had an unquenchable lust for fame and fortune. Burton's famous love of money, and Taylor's rapacious love of diamonds and jewels. Epitomising the vulgarity of an age, their lives revealed the darker impossibility of finding fulfilment in addiction.

Taylor's obsessional hypochondria, drug dependence, ability to create filth in luxurious settings, and desire to be abused by her male partners are deeply disturbing, whilst Burton's alcoholism and brooding self-hatred betray an agonising insecurity.

As Lent begins their shoddy, glamorous story is an off the shelf morality tale showing what goes wrong when we make gods of those things which should be our servants.

The monk, Thomas Merton puts it painfully clearly. If we are fools enough to remain at the mercy of the people who want to sell us happiness, it will be impossible for us ever to be content with anything. How would they profit if we became content? We would no longer need their product. The last thing the salesman wants is for the buyer to become content. You are of no use to our affluent society unless you are always just about to grasp what you never have.

Merton's anger and frustration whilst sounding like monastic intolerance, is rooted in a love for people, God's creation, who he sees being so damaged and abused by lies: The population of the affluent world is nourished on a steady diet of brutal mythology and hallucination, kept at a constant pitch of high tension by a life that is intrinsically violent in that it forces a large part of the population to submit to an existence which is humanly intolerable

May this Lent be a helpful time of prayerful, humble honesty.

BIBURY GARDENING CLUB

One always tries to come up with new and exciting ideas for garden club talks, so I was thrilled to see that the club members seemed to enjoy two elements of last month's talk in particular.

The first was an animated map, which moved the outline of north-west Europe, including the UK, across the Atlantic and superimposed it over a map of North America. Or, to be more specific, Canada.

We were talking about the difference between gardening in America and gardening in the UK, so the point of the map was to show how difficult it is to draw comparisons between the hardiness zones in the two countries.

Thanks to our mild maritime climate, it is easy to forget that here in Bibury, we are north of the 51st parallel, the same (give or take) as London, and quite a way north of Toronto and Quebec, never mind Chicago and New York.

So how come the winter temperature here isn't -15C like it is in Winnipeg this time of the year? It's because of the Gulf Stream, which brings warm water up from the Caribbean past the shores of north-west Europe and keeps our little island – and our gardens – from freezing over completely. Thank goodness we have something going for us here in the UK.

The second popular item was a short film of the dancing fountains at Longwood gardens in Pennsylvania. Longwood sums up the difference between US and UK gardens all by itself: bigger, brighter, not exactly brasher but certainly erring on the side of ostentation. If gardens were musicals, this one would be on Broadway.

Altogether, there are 1,719 fountains at Longwood, and in September and October, from Thursday to Saturday at 8.15pm, there is a fountain display set to music with coloured lights, flames and jets of water rotating and leaping 175ft into the air. It is phenomenal.

Our March meeting features a talk by Joff Elphick, who has worked at Le Manoir, Thyme and Barnsley House, to name but a few. It is entitled Crayfish on the Lawn: Plants, People and Natural History. If that isn't enough to intrigue you, I don't know what is.

BIBLIT 2024: THE BIBURY LITERARY FESTIVAL IS BACK

We have a fantastic line-up this year – so good, in fact, that the main festival is running over two days. We also have a special event ahead of that, featuring historian Peter Frankopan, who will be discussing his new book, The Earth Transformed: An Untold History on Saturday 13 April at 6pm in St Mary's Church, Bibury. Tickets include drinks which will be served at 5.30pm.

The main festival will be held on Saturday 20 April and Sunday 21 April and our writers include Sir Nicholas Coleridge, who takes over as Provost of Eton in September; Boris Johnson biographer Andrew Gimson and journalist and writer Robert Hardman, whose latest book gives the inside story of the first months of the reign of Charles III.

On the evening of Saturday 20 April there will be a discussion on writing memoir and biography featuring biographer Anne de Courcy, historian Jane Ridley and Lady Henrietta Spencer Churchill, whose new book on Blenheim Palace comes out in the autumn. This event will also include drinks.

Novelists Sally Page and Caroline Montague will be discussing their sources of inspiration – in the case of Caroline Montague with her own daughter-in-law, Theo Clarke, MP for Stafford. Theo will be a familiar face to many Bibury residents; she is Bibury born and bred.

Food writer James Read will be talking about his book Cabbages and Kimchi, which focuses on fermented foods such as kimchi, kefir and kombucha, and the benefits they offer.

James Fleming, Ian Fleming's nephew, will be discussing the creator of James Bond with Nicholas Shakespeare, whose new book on Ian Fleming is the first authorised biography since 1966.

Ysenda Maxtone Graham is the author of Jobs For The Girls and she will be looking at the history of working women from 1950 to the present day.

Victoria Summerley and Abigail Willis are the authors of Secret Gardens of the Cotswolds and Secret Gardens of Somerset, and they will share the stories of their adventures behind the high walls and yew hedges of some of South-West England's most beautiful gardens.

For the first time this year, we have a musical element. Bibury resident Mark Stanga, who also has a home in Arlington, Virginia, is bringing a wind quintet and they will be performing Peter and the Wolf for Bibury's schoolchildren in the church on Friday at 2.30pm.

And the film is ... A Haunting in Venice

For his third film based on Agatha Christie's Poirot novels, Kenneth Branagh has turned his attention to one of the author's lesser-known stories, *Hallowe'en Party*. Swapping its 1969 English hamlet location for the fog-choked canals of post-World War II Venice and a crumbling palazzo with death in its walls, this whodunit with a splash of horror will keep you on the edge of your seat.

BIBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from our Meeting on Tuesday 13TH February 2024

There were 50 members of the public present, many of whom were there to hear of plans for Ablington Manor and the tree related planning application in the area of Cemetery Lane.. Because of the significance and possible disruption over several years, the presentation and questions were given almost an hour which meant that two plans for the Trout Farm will not be discussed until our next meeting on Tuesday 12th March.

Work traffic and noise from a generator, along with concerns at the volume of soil removal to facilitate an underground car park were the main subjects of concern. One significant matter to be reviewed was the possibility of soil being retained on site rather than driven by lorries, probably 8/9 a day, for its removal. The Parish Council's submission on these plans will be given at our next meeting.

24/00132T/CONR – Land to SE of Cemetery Lane & 24/153/TCONTR – Land N of Cemetery Lane – Tree works detailed which were not agreed in all cases. There was a case presented for a tree survey to be required as some had amenity value and were an important visual element in these sites.

24/00142/LBC – Bridge House, The Street: Installation of aluminium framed secondary glazing – there were no objections.

Parish Plan Working Group - Mehdi Mahjour, who Chairs the group reported on the Questionnaire which will be included with Village Life, including a link / QR code to the online version (preferred). It will take 5-15 minutes to complete and will give us a snapshot of the community's views on the current state of the village and its ambition for the future. The Parish Council will be the arbiter of matters to take forward from the survey. The Questionnaire is in 3 parts, (1) Theme-based questions (e.g. facilities, community etc), (2) Open questions about life in Bibury and (3) Contact details which are optional but would be very helpful.

Traffic Working Group – Jason Holt who Chairs this group which has met twice with Highways, Enforcement and Traffic Regulation Office. A camera on the bridge for 2 weeks will give detailed information to consider (whilst allowance will be made on the basis that there is increased usage in the Summer or a repeat survey) which will help to solidify their proposals which will be put to the Parish Council for consideration.

NEXT MEETING: Tuesday 12th March 2024 when a presentation will be made regarding plans for the development of the land North of Cemetery Lane.

BIBURY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

A special village school, serving Bibury and the surrounding villages

Acorns Class: Acorn Class have made a busy start. As part of our Design and Technology teaching, Acorns developed their cooking skills by making Swiss Mac and Cheese. They worked on their cutting and chopping skills as well learning more about healthy eating.

In Forest School, we have decamped to the playground for a while as the site is flooded. Last week, we experimented with making dams like a beaver. In Science, we have investigated forces with lots of experiments using push and pull forces. We have looked at how different materials are affected by gravity, how different surfaces affect cars travelling down ramps and how the shape of objects affects how far they fly.

In swimming, lots of children have made super progress showing lots of confidence in the pool.

Oaks Class: Oaks have been busy writing their very own holiday brochure which relates to next term's history topic, The Stone Age. As a class, we started by building sentences together, making sure that we are persuading tourists to visit Skara Brae. Oaks have used a range of writing techniques to achieve this, such as rhetorical questions, alliteration and similes. Since then, Oaks have now written and created their very own holiday brochure about Stonehenge.

Healthy Schools Intervention

Oaks and Mighty Oaks have been tasked to think about sleeping patterns, what a good sleep environment looks like and what type of techniques there are to help people sleep better. As a class and in groups, we have discussed a range of things, for example, the potential reasons for sleeping problems, looked a range of different sleep scenarios and reflected on whether Oaks and Mighty Oaks can relate to any of these. Please see parent poster attached for more information.

All the Oaks enjoyed a STEM workshop on Wednesday morning, where they were challenged to design a vehicle to collect 3 types of waste using K'Nex. The instructor was really impressed with the originality of their design ideas and their ability to work together to solve problems in the construction. The winners of the challenge, who will be invited to take part in the finals later in the year were ARC and IA from year 6, whose vehicle included a sorter to make sure that rubbish went into the correct compartment as well as air fresheners to counteract the unpleasant smells. Congratulations to them.

Mighty Oaks Class: Mighty Oaks have begun the term in a hardworking vein: in mathematics, year 6 have been learning how to solve problems of ratio and proportion and have begun to explore algebra. Year 5 have been using efficient strategies for multiplication and division to solve complex problems and make sense of any remainders. They begin another unit on fractions next week.

We have been conducting lots of practical investigations in science in order to recognise irreversible changes. Most recently, we made gas-powered rockets using the reaction of vinegar and bicarbonate of soda and a type of organic plastic using milk. Here is a report of the rocket investigation from ARC in year 6:

Vinegar and Bicarbonate of Soda Rocket

Have you ever made a rocket? Have you ever wondered how to make a rocket? Well, with just two main ingredients, we made a rocket launch over 10 metres!

What we did

First, we filled a 35mm film canister about half way with distilled vinegar. Inside the lid of the canister, there is a dip and we decided to put the bicarb there, but to make sure it stuck and so the reaction did not occur when trying to put the lid on, we mixed the smallest bit of water with it; you want to put enough so it clumps together but is still powdery and not liquid. We patted that down until it was smooth and would not fall out when flipped upside-down.

We decided to find a space where there were no other people who could be harmed. Once we were all set up, me and my partner placed the lid on top and flipped the canister; then we backed away to a safe distance. Every time we did it, the time from when we placed it down to when it exploded varied, but on all of our successful attempts, it was no longer than 20 seconds. Once we perfected our mixture, we tried to make it fly as high as it could.

Why this happened

When the bicarb and vinegar mixed, a reaction took place. A gas was formed and grew bigger in volume (but as the top was shut, the gas couldn't be released) and eventually over time the gas could not fit in so it made the lid come off and the canister fly in the other direction up into the air. We found that the rocket went higher when we added distilled vinegar instead of malt.
