Dear Friends,

BibLit 24 has now been and gone, and I want to express heartfelt thanks to the speakers, to our brilliant Committee and to the superb volunteers who ran the weekend event. But if you missed it there are still some great speakers still to come this year.

On Friday 7th June, former MP, Lord (Nicholas) Soames will be here to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day with a talk about his grandfather, Sir Winston Churchill. Drinks at 6:00pm followed by the talk at 6:30pm. Entrance free.

On Saturday 6th July we welcome Lord (Charles) Moore, former Editor of The Times, who, with Kate Ehrman, reflects on The Fall of Mrs Thatcher. Moore wrote the authorised three volume biography of the Iron Lady. Tickets are £10 and can be booked on the Bibury Festivals website or bought at the door. Again, 6:00pm drinks followed by a 6:30pm talk.

On Friday 6th September Dame Fiona Reynolds formerly Director General of the National Trust, and Master of Emmanuel College Cambridge, and currently Chair of the Royal Agricultural University, as well as Chair of the national Audit Office, joins us to give the Inaugural Sir Crispin Tickell Memorial Lecture. Diplomat, environmentalist and world class academic, Crispin was one of Bibury's most distinguished residents, as well as being a wonderful man. He died in 2022 and it was agreed that his life should be marked by an annual lecture at the church that invites a speaker with environmental wisdom to share, to come to Bibury.

Dame Fiona is our first distinguished guest, and all are welcome to drinks at 6:00pm, followed by a lecture. Both Isabella Tree, of the Knepps Castle estate, and author of Wilding, and writer and academic, Katherine Rundell have expressed a willingness to come and join us in future years.

And on Saturday 28th September at 6:00pm we have out own Election special with broadcaster, author and political commentator, Iain Dale. Named broadcaster of the year in both 2013 and 016, Iain currently cohosts a weekly political and current affairs podcast, For the Many alongside former Home Secretary, Jacqui Smith

Other things to look forward to in the next few weeks include:

Beating the Bounds on 12th May. Instead of a normal church service we will walk from Bibury to Barnsley on to Winson and then back to Bibury for a barbecue. Along the way we will delight in and give thanks for God's creation whilst praying for a good harvest. Do join us at any stop along the route and do feel free to bring canine friends.

Art Exhibition The weekend of 7th-9th June we play host to a wonderful Art Exhibition laid on by Lynne Edward and friends. It has been arranged to coincide with the Village Garden Festival. There will a BBQ in the Churchyard on Sunday.

Pop up teas return in May. Starting at 3:00pm they will take place in either the church or the church yard (Depending on weather conditions) on Friday 3rd May, Monday 27th May, Friday 28th June. If you want to help in any way, bake a cake or help in hosting do let me know. It is a great way to both serve the school and to make our village visitors welcome.

Israel trip reunion On Tuesday 14th May we host our Israel trip reunion. And the next Village Prayer Meeting takes place on Wednesday 19th June at 6:00pm at The Vicarage.

And, looking further ahead do put Sunday 11th August in your diaries for a service of thanksgiving where all who have been married are invited to reaffirm their wedding vows.

And on Sunday 30th June there will be no service at any of our three churches as we all go to Gloucester Cathedral for a 10:30 service where our extraordinary and wonderful church warden, Jackie Colburn will be ordained. This a very special moment, not just for Jackie, but for all of us, as Jackie offers herself in service to the whole village community. As the Rev Jackie takes up her role as associate priest of Bibury with Winson and Barnsley she is assured of the love, thoughts and prayers of all of us.

As an aside, we believe that Jackie is the first ordinand put forward by our parishes in over 100 years. The first of many we hope!

And as a further aside, Jackie's ordination is in no way connected to the Hastie-Smith move to Barnsley in September, which some of you may have heard about. This is simply a practical decision that enables my increasingly frail 92-year-old mother to come a live with us, whilst at the same time allowing the diocese to address the challenge of an increasingly crumbling Vicarage. It also secures our future in serving these wonderful villages as long as you ae willing to put up with us and I remain Vicar of Bibury with Winson and Barnsley. We will simply have a different address. And Barnsley will have a resident priest for the first time for a few decades. But there will be no change to the pattern of services and events. However, it does create one new problem (for me) How to deal with an estimated 600 boxes of books. So, change and decay in all around I see. But summer is coming.

BIBURY PARISH COUNCIL Notes from a meeting on 9th April 2024

There were 16 members of the public present who raised concerns regarding:

- Lights by the new wall on Awkward Hill and a very bright light at The Trout Farm
- Whether there is a need for additional housing for sale to downsizers within the village
- Trout Farm lack of engagement with the village and future development plans. Wildlife police need to be contacted to ensure it's natural areas are not being damaged
- As stewards of this area we need the ability to manage the tourism it attracts. The Bathurst Estate sell tickets for £10 for local people and more for tourists
- Parish Council should resubmit for TPO in the 'Orchard' by Cemetery Lane

Highways Matters:

Crossroads on the way to Fosse Cross have been resurfaced.

Parking Enforcement: Concern as their visits seem to have gone down and this needs to be improved. Enforcement cameras have shown 61 over-weight vehicles going over the bridge at The Swan and over 2 weeks 40,000 vehicles.

District Councillor: David Fowles reported on CDC's decision on 2nd homes that remain unoccupied for more than a year should pay 100% council tax, empty homes up to 5 years should pay 200%. Most of the money goes to the County Council.

Finance: It was agreed to pay the Clerk for extra hours accrued this year, in view of the increased workload particularly relating to planning / green space matters. It was also agreed to pay £50 towards the Village Hall Management Committee's Annual show.

Planning:

- Cobblers, Church Road: No objections raised
- Barn House, Hawker's Hill: No objections raised
- Ablington Manor: Still concerns regarding removal of soil. There was a query raised regarding electrical aspects of the project to ensure the village's electricity supply is not prejudiced by the development. Also, concern regarding the impact of the underground carpark with regards to the water table and run-off to the River Coln.

Football Club: There is a need to raise funds for improvements to the building.

BIBURY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

A special village school & Preschool, serving Bibury and the surrounding villages

Little Acorns: We opened our Little Acorns preschool on Monday 8th April. This is part of our Early Years Class and will be led by Mrs Spring & Mrs Williams. Children aged 3 and 4 years will be able to attend, learning and developing their skills through play, ready to begin their school life.

Session are: Morning 9am - 12 noon or All Day 9am - 3pm. Monday to Friday, term time only. We will be accepting government funding.

Acorns Class: Have been orienteering! They took part in lots of team building games and used maps to help them solve a variety of puzzles. The children worked well together and showed lots of initiative and team working skills. This activity was followed up with an explorer's campfire where we tasted a variety of explorer foods and made s'mores over the fire.

More cooking followed the next week with a visit from Kitchen Club. The Easter theme was a particular favourite with the creation of egg sandwiches, chocolate nests and hot cross buns. Yum!

We have been busy in Science learning about Polar habitats and how the weather conditions mean that polar animals have to cope with the harsh conditions. This has tied in well with our History topic on explorers where we have also looked at the quest to reach the South Pole by Roald Amundsen and Captain Scott. The children were surprised to learn about quite how hard it was to reach the South Pole over 100 years ago.

Oaks & Mighty Oaks: This term, Oaks and Mighty Oaks have been learning all about the Stone Age. They have explored how life has changed for people during different periods of the Stone Age, including the Early, Middle and New Stone Ages (Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic) and thought about why the period was called the Stone Age. In recent lessons, Oaks and Mighty Oaks have looked at what archaeological evidence there is from the period, particularly in the form of artefacts and monuments, for example, the Neolithic settlement at Skara Brae. To further engage them in this unit, Oaks and Mighty Oaks had the chance to experience a wonderful trip to Oxenwood Outdoor Education Centre where they got the chance to dive further into this time period.

And the film is... The Miracle Club

This golden-hued heart warmer stars Kathy Bates, Maggie Smith, Laura Linney and Stephen Rea.

Set in a seaside town near Dublin in 1967, it follows a group of women who win a trip to Lourdes in a parish talent competition. They have two main reasons for going: to get away from their dreary, reliant menfolk and to secure a miracle for a boy who has never spoken.

Directed by Irish film-maker Thaddeus O'Sullivan, this mild-mannered comedy explores grief and grievances, and a gentle message about forgiveness that's delivered skillfully by an adept cast.

- At 88, Smith's comic timing is as beautifully crisp as ever, but she also gets some fierce scenes of suppressed grief and one lovely scene of reconciliation that is blindingly good. *Sunday Times*
- Grab your hot water bottle, butter some toast and ease into this bland-but-sweet big screen blanket. *The Sun*
- Lushly scored, *The Miracle Club* is gently humorous, mildly sentimental, but, thanks to its excellent cast, contains moments of real dramatic tension. *Irish Independent*
- The great treat is to have another chance to spend some time with Smith, beyond Downton or Alan Bennett. She is, in her quasi-paralytic way, transfixingly wonderful, the smallest twitches and downturns conveying so much experience and contempt. *New Statesman*

BibLit 2024

I never expected to hear the word "Kohlfahrt"* at a BibLit event. It was used by James Read, whose book, Of Cabbages and Kimchi, deals with the practicalities, the history and the science of fermented food. It is nominated for Fortnum & Mason's Food Book of the Year 2024, and James's talk was just one example of the many events which comprised this year's BibLit.

There was the King's Men concert; Peter Frankopan's lecture; the talk with novelist Sally Page, from which emerged an eerie ghost story; Sir Nicholas Coleridge, who packed the house; Ysenda Maxtone Graham, who is now writing a piece for The Spectator on tourism in Bibury (yes, really!); Andrew Gimson on Boris Johnson; Nicholas Shakespeare talking with James Fleming about Ian Fleming.

Then there was the discussion on memoir-writing, with Anne de Courcy, Professor Jane Ridley and Lady Henrietta Spencer-Churchill; Robert Hardman on the inside story of Charles III's accession; Abigail Willis on the gorgeous Secret Gardens of Somerset; the Arlington Wind Quintet concert; Arthur

Reynolds on composer Edward Elgar, who owed so much of his success to the music-loving Edward VII and finally novelist Caroline Montague talking to Theo Clarke about the Potteries.

Everyone will have their own favourite moments, but one of mine was seeing the Bibury schoolchildren talking to the Arlington Wind Quintet who had come all the way across the Atlantic to perform Peter and the Wolf for them. "Does anyone know what this instrument is called?" asked bassoonist Kathy. "Yes," said one little boy. "A bazooka!"

I think guest of honour Prue Leith, who officially opened the festival, put it really well when she said it was extraordinary to think that a small village like Bibury could have organised an event of this scale, and that local people could go and hear writers of such calibre talking for only £7.50 a ticket.

It IS extraordinary, and it is down to a lot of hard work from a lot of people. The BibLit committee – Tim Hastie-Smith, Jackie Colburn, Anne de Courcy, Sara Gorst, Mike Pini, Lavinia Sidgwick and myself – owe a debt of gratitude to all our volunteers who sold tickets, manned car parks, served drinks and made canapes.

We would also like to thank the village hall team headed by Angela Staton, who provided tea and wonderful cake.

Not everyone in the village might know Mark Stanga, but French horn player Mark and his wife Jane, who live in Arlington, Virginia, also have a cottage here in Bibury. It was Mark's determination and energy that brought the wind quintet here from America and helped establish a musical dimension to BibLit which I hope will continue in the future.

Finally, I would like to thank you, the audience, for supporting us. Jackie Colburn said at one point during BibLit: "People keep coming up and thanking me for organising it and I feel I should thank them for coming." I completely agree. Look forward to seeing you all again at BibLit 2026.

Joff Elphick's talk in March promised us "Crayfish on the Lawn", a title which was intriguing enough, you might think. However, while we did indeed get crayfish on the lawn (of which more later), we also got the truth about Tomorrow's World presenter Judith Hann's bunny being eaten by Rick Stein's Jack Russell Chalky: a recording of Pam Ayres reciting her heartbreaking poem, The Last Hedgehog, and a host of images of gardens, plants and creatures.

Joff's commentary on all of these things was both amusing and informed and for those of us who were feeling a bit jaded garden-wise, thanks to incessant rain, soggy ground and gloomy skies, it made us all want to get back out in our gardens.

The crayfish in the question was found on the lawn of Thyme, in Southerop, 300 yards from the nearest water course. How did it get there? Was it dropped by a predator such as a heron? Or an otter? We'll never know.

April's talk was on the subject of cherry blossom and how Collingwood "Cherry" Ingram, an English plant collector, helped restore Japan's native cherry tree species which had dwindled owing to the popularity of a fast-growing reliable hybrid cultivar.

I love the story of "Cherry" Ingram sitting at a formal Japanese tea ceremony in the 1920s, and being shown an antique painting of a particular wild cherry tree which was thought to be extinct in Japan. "Oh yes," he told his astonished hosts, "I recognise that tree, I have one in my back garden."

This month's meeting, on Wednesday 8 May, will be a visit to Vanessa Berridge's garden in Winchcombe. Please note the earlier time of 6-8pm.

June's meeting will be on Wednesday 12 June, at the same time, at Charlton Farm, Charlton, nr Malmesbury.
